RC Report

Where do you go to get your forecasts? Sourcing the best possible information about wind and weather is crucial to our sport. I want to know ahead of a race if I should be expecting a drifter or if a system is moving through the area that could mean very high winds. If I see in the forecast winds up to 20 kts. steady on race day, I know this can mean gusts to speeds at least half again as much. Racing a Melges 24, I just might decide to stay home, or at



least have a plan to retire and duck in somewhere before the finish if things get too wild. And if the forecast says 0 to nothing, I'll plan for 1 or even 2 less crew that day. But we all know you just can't be sure about the weather. Forecasts are often wrong.

When someone tells me their prediction for wind and weather, I always want to know where they got their forecast. It seems that weather apps are very popular with sailors in our community. I have subscribed to *Sailflow* in the past, and tried others such as *PredictWind*, *Wind Aler*t, etc. There's even a link on our web site to *Windy.com*. I like apps with maps where you can zoom in to the area of interest and click on actual weather stations that show the present wind speed and direction in addition to the last few hours, and the forecast into the next day.

But where do all these weather apps get their data, you might ask. If you look carefully at any of these, you will see the models on which their forecasts are based. Take Windy for example. At the bottom

right corner of their display, you will see "forecast models" with acronyms like GFS, NAM, or HRRR. I am most familiar with the Global Forecast System computer model as used by the UW Deptment of Atmospheric Sciences.

Their web site is an amazing source of weather information. And I prefer going there rather

than using a weather app,

specifically a thing called the WRF Pacific Northwest model found at https://a.atmos.washington.ed u/wrfrt/gfsinit.html. Many Washington sailors like myself have been using this web site since the 1990s and I find it to be remarkably accurate. The UW publishes these computer runs twice a day, in the morning and evening. I click on "Western WA 10m Wind Speed" in the 12 km domain section and then on the number of hours in the future that I will add to the time of the forecast (ie. 4 pm

When someone said to me, this last week, "Watch out. We're about to be hit by a bomb cyclone". I went to WRF-GFS and told them with some confidence "No were not, not here in Olympia". According to the UW wind maps, the wind speeds were quite high north of Seattle and also out on the coast, but it

quite high north of Seattle and also out on the coast, but it showed only moderate wind speeds in the South Sound. And thankfully, this turned out to be what happened.

Sorry to be a broken record, but we still need RC volunteers for many upcoming races. So once again, I am asking that boat owners who race, or any Member, to please go to the RC Duty roster on our web site and help us fill these positions.

And if you attempt to log in but can't, that probably means you haven't paid your Membership dues. And if you race your boat, this also means



you haven't paid your race dues. I'll be reaching out to individual boat owners who are racing but have forgotten to take care of this.

And here's another reminder of the Andrew Kerr seminar scheduled for January16th from 18:00 to 20:00 at the View Point Room, below Tugboat Annie's at Westbay Marina. Info on how to sign up for this event is forthcoming, with an announcement to be made at our December Meeting.

A Note on the Weather

Tucker was asking where you get your weather forecasts. Taking that back a step, they all come from the Federal Government, the National Weather Service. Wherever you get your forecast, the weather data comes from them. They have been collecting weather information across the country for over 150 years.

Starting in the 1990s, enterprising Federal employees greatly improved the accuracy of weather forecasting. They networked all the various information that the NWS collects, from weather balloons to radar images. Then they put it together on line, free for the public. Much more data, much better forecasts.

Those making your app repackage that data for you. They may even use the data to make their own forecasts. Note that however much they charge, when studied, none have proven *consistently* better than the NWS (that is USA forecasts, weather routing across oceans is an other story).






Death of a Sailor: Frank Neumann

Frank was an very active Member. He raced in every venue we offer. I met him when I took him out in my Star, before he got his own. He crewed PHRF, and though he bought his J24 to cruise, he raced her too. He even spent a season racing a Laser. Ed.

The south sound has lost one of our finest sailing Members in the death of Mr. Frank Neumann. The Crew on Bodacious was lucky enough to have Frank sail with us for several years at our local races here and the Southern Sound Series, Race Week, and Tri IslandSeries up in Seattle. Frank was always up for about anything and always reveled in a good sail, a beautiful sunset, a great mountain view or just a good beer with friends. If you were lucky enough to know Frank you would know he had a Zest for Life that few people have. It seemed he was always sailing, skiing, hiking, biking or kayaking both here or in Europe, where he would often go to visit family and get in a good hike or climb. Often he would get in two or three days of skiing in the week before he would sail with us on Saturday! He was an inspiration to me and to our whole crew because of his abilities and the good health he enjoyed right up until the end. It came as a complete surprise to learn of his passing. I was looking forward to trying to keep with him skiing again this year.

A short story about Frank: about five years ago in March Frank invited me to go skiing with him up at Crystal Mountain after a big dump of spring snow. Now keep in mind Frank is about 15 years older than me. The very first run of the day he took me to the very top of the mountain and after a long traverse we came to one of his favorite runs. It was a

black diamond chute that was prone to avalanche but he said was now perfectly safe as the ski patrol had already Shot it with explosives and opened it up. He took off down that
